#### Learning for an Engaged Life by Gary Hansen

Have you ever wondered why some students turn their minds away from lessons being taught, or from school altogether?

Some of my best public schooling memories are when I was learning about events or challenges in our larger society. For example, hearing Mel Hurtig speak to my high school social studies class moved me to go to downtown Edmonton on a Saturday morning to collect signatures on a Committee for an Independent Canada petition. A Biology 30 project to measure noise pollution at several major intersections in Edmonton during rush hour earned me an honourable grade. And a grade nine option class project, researching and writing an essay on the merits of the space race, energized me.

So how is it that some students find their schooling boring? The answer may, in part, be found by asking the questions, "Does the content of courses connect students to <a href="their">their</a> world? Do Indigenous students see their lives, their struggles, their challenges, and the contributions of their community to society reflected in the life of the school and in their learning? How about working class students? Immigrant students? LGBTQ, students?" About 20% of Alberta students come from families living in poverty. Do these students see themselves in their studies? Without this content, students are missing the validation of their lives and significance learning.

To explore the reality of "boring learning," another question to be asked is, "Do students have a voice in <u>their</u> learning?" A pedagogy that allows a student to explore their understanding of an issue, allows them through dialogue to make the connections of their lives to the larger world they live in. Student engagement in their learning allows them to develop a deeper understanding of the issue and of their lives.

An attitude prevalent not only in schools, but in the whole of society, is that, "I can't do anything about it, so it is no use trying" Can we connect this attitude to student learning?

The lack of meaningful learning material and minimal student voice sends a clear message to discourage students from their learning. Conversely, if students are allowed to engage with the world around them as they learn, it encourages them to participate in shaping that world. It leads to fulfilling the vision of an educated students as being "...engaged, active, informed and responsible citizens...aware of their capacity to effect change in their communities, society and world." (*Alberta Social Studies Program of Studies, 2005*)

If we are to have a thriving democracy, we must have curricula and a pedagogy that is inclusive of students who are currently not accurately represented in our curricula and whose voices and communities have been silenced. There is a great opportunity here for educators to support these students to be engaged in their schooling and be empowered for life.
